


Since its founding, the Global Alliance has

The Global Alliance

The Global Alliance was founded in New York City in 2019 to foster connections among Indigenous Peoples from the seven socio-cultural zones of our world. The Global Alliance works to:

- 1. Uphold the Rights of Indigenous Peoples and Sacred Spaces
- 2. Nurture Indigenous Knowledge through Art, Films, Books, Songs, Dance, Science, Medicine, Cuisine, Language, and Sports
- 3. Support the development and pursuit of Indigenous Economies
- 4. Establish structures of and support for Indigenous peace and conflict resolution practices
- 5. Support and promote the inclusion of Indigenous peoples and sacred beings in key political decisionmaking processes and positions
- 6. Demilitarize & Decontaminate Indigenous Lands, Eco-systems, Territories and Sacred Spaces
- 7. Develop truth and reconciliation processes, and justice mechanisms, to address long standing acts of war, genocide, and racism
- 8. Protect Indigenous peoples who are defenders of the environment and community rights

Global Indigeneity

There are an estimated 476 million Indigenous peoples in the world who live across 90 countries. Although they make up less than 6% of the global population, Indigenous peoples speak an overwhelming majority of the world's estimated 7,000 languages. Indigenous territories currently stretch just over 20% of our earth, but represent over 80% of our world's biodiversity.





Women & Conflict Zones

Forty active conflicts are known in the world, while over 84 million people are currently displaced from their homes, over 26.6 million of those displaced peoples are refugees. As armed conflicts continue to escalate, countless more communities experience human rights violations, of which, women and marginalized communities are disproportionately affected.
